"Your Majesty," the man replied with a short bow.

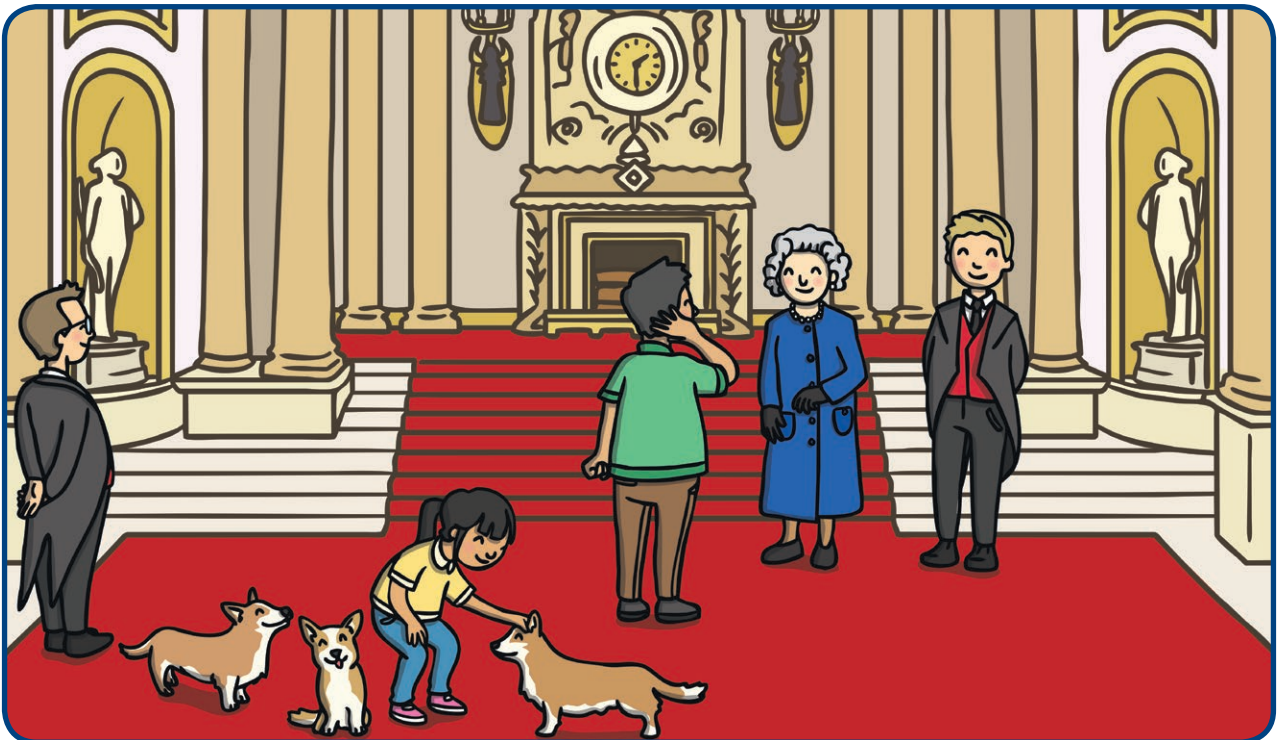
'Majesty?' thought Anisha.
