Read or listen to a rhyming story on YouTube. Can your child identify the rhyming words?

This is the Bear and the Scary Night - Rhyming Story

Practise orally blending (putting the sounds together) and segmenting (saying the sounds) in cvc words e.g. c-a-t, b-a-g, h-a-t.

Maths

- Draw a big ladybird and use it in lots of different ways:
- Hold up a number. Can your child finger paint or draw the right number of spots? Extend by splitting the lady bird in half. Can your child draw the right number of spots on each side and say how many spots they have altogether? Cross out spots or use counters to take some away. How many are left?
- Paint or draw a symmetrical butterfly.

Understanding the World

- Go into the garden or go to a park to see if you can find any minibeasts e.g. worms, ladybirds, spiders, tadpoles or frogs.
- Draw mini-beasts and find out facts about them on YouTube, Google search, in books etc.
- Find out about life-cycles of minibeasts e.g. butterfly, ladybird, frog etc.
