Broken Weeks - children who regularly miss a day here or there have what we call 'broken weeks' of learning. Teacher will not always be able to re-explain missed work and children can become confused about tasks when they return.

Children with a raised temperature above 38 degrees, vomiting or diarrhoea should of course be kept at home.


